## Diarrhea

#### Diarrhea: Worry or wait?

Diarrhea is no fun for you or your dog, but the good news is that most cases resolve on their own. Mild cases are usually uncomplicated, and the dog is otherwise happy and normal.

Many cases of diarrhea in dogs and cats are mild and self-limiting. If a pet stops eating, is lethargic, the diarrhea is black or tarry in quality, there is associated vomiting, or the diarrhea doesn't resolve in 48-72 hours then veterinary care should be sought.

The most common causes of diarrhea are

- Change of diet
- A stressful event, such as going to the veterinarian, being boarded, or going to a new home
- Vaccinations
- Eating a foreign object
- Introducing new treats too quickly

The best way to treat diarrhea at home is a **bland diet.** 

Mild cases of diarrhea in both cats and dogs can be treated at home by feeding a bland diet such as boiled chicken or low-fat hamburger, and white rice. Cooked pasta is another option. These foods are easy to digest, so they give your dog's GI tract a break. A product like digestive care is really good to mix into their diet as well.

The exception to this rule would be if your dog has an allergy or intolerance to one of these foods — if that is the case, avoid the problematic ingredient to prevent further upset. Another tip is to start by withholding all food for 12-24 hours, then introduce the bland diet. Note: These bland diets are not appropriate for long-term feeding as they are not nutritionally balanced.

If your dog is experiencing diarrhea after switching to a new food, it may be that you made the switch too quickly. Go back to feeding the original diet until their stools have firmed up again, then restart the transition process but go more gradually. For example, instead of feeding 75% of the original diet and 25% of the new diet on the first day, 50% of each on the second day, and then 25% original and 75% new on the third day, spread the transition over a week or two so that your dog's GI tract has more time to adjust.

Owners should avoid excessive treats or rich food until the diarrhea resolves.

If your dog still has diarrhea after 3 or 4 days or has large amounts of blood in their poo, then you should consult a vet.



## Pet registration

Every dog and cat three months of age and over must be registered with your local council. Existing registrations must be renewed by 10 April each year.

Registration fees are set by your local council, and vary depending on a number of factors. Contact your council to find out which fees apply to your pet.

You are eligible for reduced registration fees if your pet is:

- de-sexed
- has an obedience certificate issued by a Government approved organisation
- over 10 years of age
- kept for working stock
- kept for breeding by the proprietor of a registered domestic animal business
- a hound registered with the GMA that is microchipped.

You also get reduced registration fees if you are a member of an applicable organisation approved by the Minister.

Pensioners who have approved concession cards issued by the Department of Social Services and Department of Veterans Affairs are also entitled to a reduction in their fees.

Registered foster carers get a significantly reduced registration fee.

- Dogs Victoria
- Feline Control Council (Victoria) Inc.
- The Governing Council of the Cat Fancy Australia and Victoria Inc
- Master Dog Breeders & Associates
- Responsible Pet Breeders Australia.

#### Renew your pet's registration each year

Don't forget to renew your pet's registration each year by 10 April.

#### **Moving home**

If you move to a new council area, make sure you transfer your pet's registration. Often when you transfer registration your new local council will only charge you a percentage of the year's registration because of the fees you have already paid. Also, remember to update your contact details with your microchip registry — this is a separate task to updating your pet registration records with your local council.

#### Lost pet tags

If your pet loses its identification marker (which must always be worn by your pet when outside your premises) you can get a new one from your local council. **Owning multiple pets** 

Owning multiple pets is a greater responsibility for any member of the community. All of your dogs and cats must be registered individually with your local council.

Some local councils require permits for residents to keep more than a particular number of dogs and cats on their property. This helps to ensure the welfare of pets, it is important that:

- they are kept in a healthy environment
- neighbors are not inconvenienced by pets.

Maximum numbers of pets per household are set by your council, and varies across the state. It is important to register all your pets. If you do not have a permit for excess animals, council can take further action.



# **GROOMING TIPS**

#### Why grooming is impo

While grooming your four-legged friend is important for removing loose hair, it also provides an opportunity for you to thoroughly check your dog over and ensure they are in optimal health. Be sure to check their ears, eyes, nails, teeth, and paw pads, as well as their skin and coat. Regular grooming also helps to keep their coat glossy and shiny.

#### Rough and smooth double coats

The border collie breed has two coat types: rough and smooth. The smooth coat is shorter in length and usually coarser in texture than the rough-coated variety. Both coat types possess what is called a 'double coat', which consists of a soft, thick undercoat and longer, water-resistant fur on top. Throughout the year, a border collie or other double-coat dog breeds will shed their coat regularly. Brushing their coat, a couple of times a week is usually enough to stay on top of the shedding. However, twice a year – during spring and autumn – your pup will completely blow their double coat and shed heavily for the season ahead. During this time, daily brushing is required to manage their shedding.

#### Checking the nails and paw pads

Be sure to check your dog's nails – overgrown nails can be painful and lead to difficulty walking. If their nails are touching the ground or if you hear them clicking when walking, it's time for a trim. Cut only the tip of the nail, avoiding the blood vessel inside (called the quick). You can see the quick inside light-coloured nails but cannot see it in dark nails. Every couple of months, trim the hair between the pads of the feet with a straight pair of scissors. If you don't feel confident trimming your dog's nails or between the pads of their feet, have a qualified dog groomer or vet do this for you.

#### Regular grooming makes all the difference

Matted fur can irritate your pup's skin and prove very difficult to manage once the damage has already been done. By grooming your dog's double coat regularly, you can prevent mats and tangles from taking over their fur and keep their skin and coat in optimal condition. Always remember to brush your pup thoroughly before bathing them. This will help to further prevent mats and tangles and save you from hair shedding all over the tub!



# FEEDING SCHEDULE 2 – 6 months

**MORNING**: 1 cup of dry food (Advance/Scratch) plus 250 grams of mince plus 1/2 cup of vegetables (frozen veg, peas, corn, carrot, beans etc) mixed together. OR you can substitute mince for ½ a tin of pedigree puppy or 250gms of chub roll or 1 cup cook up (see below)

\*COOK UP- a mix of minced meat, (chicken/beef) pasta and/or rice, stock, crumbed bread, and mixed veggies (no onion) all cooked up together.

#### EVENING: 1 cup of dry food plus

250 grams of fresh meat (i.e., raw/cooked chicken, lamb, beef, kangaroo, goat, mince, raw chicken frames) or 1 cup cook-up (see above)

- Increase the amount according to age and appetite.
- Fresh raw bones at least twice per week (after 4 months of age).
- NO COOKED BONES.
- Introduce any new foods slowly into their diet to not upset their bellies.
- Plain yogurt (1Tbspn mixed into wet food) Acts like a probiotic for upset tummies/diarrhea.
- Feed once in the morning and once at night until approximately 6 months of age.

When introducing a new dry food, slowly change over a 10-day period. See the example below.

- Day 1 90% old food 10% new food Day 2 – 80% old food 20% new food Day 3 – 70% old food 30% new food Day 4 – 60% old food 40% new food Day 5 – 50% old food 50% new food
- Day 6 40% old food 60% new food Day 7 – 30% old food 70% new food Day 8 – 20% old food 80% new food Day 9 – 10% old food 90% new food Day 10 – 0% old food 100% new food

## Poisonous plants for dogs to avoid



#### **Hydrangeas**

If your dog digests this popular plant, they are likely to encounter a seriously upset stomach and possible side effects like depression, high heart rates and temperature, and vomitina.



#### Laburnum

All parts of these glorious golden plants are poisonous to dogs (although the seeds are the most poisonous) and can cause nasty symptoms including nausea and vomiting if digested. In some cases it can be fatal







#### Lily of the valley

They may look pretty and smell sweet, but these plants are highly poisonous to dogs and cause serious harm. When ingested, the plants can cause vomiting, diarrhoea and even seizures.

#### lvy

Fortunately, it is relatively well known that ivy is poisonous to canines. Causing harm both inside and out, including dermatitis and damage to your dog's gastrointestinal tract, ivy should be avoided and never consumed

#### Lupine

Although a large amount of this flowering plant would need to be ingested and incidents of lupine poisoning in dogs seems to be rare, it is known to be toxic to dogs and so should still be avoided.





This highly toxic tree must be avoided, with every part posing a threat to both dogs and humans. Even taking a drink of water with an oleander leaf floating in it can potentially poison your pawed pal.



#### <u>Rhubarb</u>

Rhubarb contains soluble oxalate crystals, which can cause pain and irritation if eaten. While pooches should avoid all parts of the rhubarb plant, rhubarb leaves can cause serious excessive salivation, lethargy, and even kidnev failure.



#### <u>Tulips</u>

If your dog decides to dig up and devour the tulip bulbs you have planted in the garden, they may suffer from a range of symptoms. These include irritation in the mouth and more severe issues such as vomiting and difficulty breathing.

Morning glories

From the stem to the bloom, every part of these bushes is toxic to your dog, with only a small amount needed to cause serious issues (including azalea plants). While the symptoms vary depending on the size of the dog and the amount eaten, inaestion can be fatal.

#### Sweet pea plants

It may be difficult to detect whether your dog is suffering the consequences of eating sweet peas, as the poisoning may take a few days to show up. The severity of the symptoms depends on the amount eaten and range from general weakness to vomiting

#### Aloe vera

Aloe vera is highly toxic to dogs, containing properties that will cause nasty symptoms including vomiting, diarrhea, seizures and more. If think your pooch has ingested aloe, make an appointment with your vet as a matter of emergency.



## Poisonous plants for dogs to avoid



#### Aconitum

Also known as wolfsbane or Monkshood, every part of this plant contains a deadly toxin that could be fatal to our furry friends. In fact, it was historically used to kill both wolves and "mad dogs".


#### Asparagus fern

Asparagus fern is mildly toxic to dogs. If your dog eats the berries of this toxic plant, they could suffer from vomiting and diarrhea. If your dog is persistently around this plant, it could also cause severe skin irritation.



#### B<u>elladonna</u>

Amaryllis Belladonna bulbs are widely known to cause dogs distressing and dangerous symptoms such as vomiting, diarrhea, lethargy, and tremors.



#### C<u>yclamen</u>

Although pretty, this flowery plant is highly toxic to dogs. If eaten, the side effects can include excessive salivation, vomiting, and diarrhea.



#### Daffodils

<u>Lilies</u>

Daffodils are dangerous when eaten by dogs. while all parts of the plant can cause problems, daffodil bulbs are particularly poisonous to dogs and can cause symptoms such as vomiting and convulsions





With their pungent smell, piercing colours and blooming petals, it's no surprise that lilies are one of the most popular plants for hallways, coffee tables and gardens around the world. But unfortunately, many varieties are poisonous to dogs, causing sickness and even acute kidney injury.



#### F<u>oxglove</u>

They may be a honeybee's best friend, but foxgloves are highly toxic for both people and dogs. If eaten, foxgloves can cause your dog to suffer severe nausea and vomiting - and can be fatal.

#### **Hyacinths**

If they chew or digest the bulbs of these springtime beauties, dogs are likely to suffer irritation in both their mouth and oesophagus. Common issues include drooling and diarrhoea, while breathing difficulties can also occur when large quantities of bulbs have been aanaumad



#### Philodendrons

Despite being popular house plants that are easy to look after, philodendrons are poisonous to dogs, so it's worth keeping them out of your pup's reach, or not at all. All parts of the plant contain insoluble crystals that are seriously uncomfortable to ingest, and can cause nasty symptoms such as vomiting, diarrhea and difficulty breathing.

#### **Delphinium**

More commonly known as larkspur, these flowering plants are highly poisonous and pose a great threat to both dogs and humans. While they can cause neuromuscular effects in our pawed pals, a small amount of the plant can kill a human.

#### H<u>emlock</u>

Even the smallest amount of this poisonous herb can cause them to look extremely overexcited, but in fact these are mimicked as symptoms such as seizures, panting, violent convulsions, and severe pain in the abdomen - these plants have also been found to cause sudden death to creatures of all shapes and sizes – be careful of Hemlock





# Human foods that are toxic to





#### Rhubarb

Commonly called the pie plant, rhubarb is frequently grown to use in desserts. However, it contains <u>soluble oxalate crystals</u>, making it toxic to pets. If ingested in large enough quantities, rhubarb can cause <u>kidney failure</u> in dogs.

#### Xylitol

Sugar-free candy, mints, and gum often contain xylitol. <u>Xylitol</u> — also called birch sugar — is a lower-calorie sugar replacement. This artificial sweetener can cause severe illness and death in dogs. To avoid xylitol poisoning, check the ingredients label on products, especially those labelled "low-sugar" or "sugar-free." Keep all items containing xylitol out of reach of pets.

#### Some peanut butters and nut butters

Peanut butter is a known favourite among dogs. But check the ingredients before giving your dog peanut butter or other nut butters, because some varieties contain xylitol. Even small amounts of <u>xylitol can cause</u> the following in dogs:

Low blood sugar, Seizures, Liver failure, Death.

#### Flavoured Water

Flavoured waters, a hugely popular option for humans, should be kept away from dogs. These products often contain xylitol as well.

#### Ice Cream

Ice cream <u>isn't a great treat</u> for your pup. Dogs can't process the lactose in milk products like ice cream. Dogs who do get a lick of your cone may experience digestive troubles like: Vomiting, Diarrhea, Gas, Stomach pain, Pancreatitis. In addition, ice cream can contain ingredients that are toxic for dogs. Chocolate, for example, is definitely a no for pups. Ice cream — especially types labelled as sugar-free — may also contain xylitol. This artificial sweetener is very toxic to dogs.



#### Chocolate

Chocolate is <u>poisonous to dogs</u> because it contains theobromine and caffeine. Both of these components cause <u>potentially deadly</u> heart and central nervous system problems in dogs. The darker the chocolate, the more theobromine it contains. Therefore, it takes less semi-sweet dark chocolate to cause toxicity than milk chocolate. Some chocolate also contains xylitol, which is harmful for dogs. Call your veterinarian or a <u>Pet Poison</u> <u>Helpline</u> immediately if you think your dog has eaten chocolate. Be prepared to tell them the type and approximate amount of chocolate your dog ate to help determine the appropriate treatment.

#### Moldy foods



Mold produces the <u>toxin aflatoxin</u>, which can cause liver failure. If dogs eat food from the garbage or compost pile, other mold <u>toxins</u> can cause: Tremors, Seizures, Vomiting, Irregular heartbeat, Lack of coordination, and Death. Keep all garbage cans securely covered where your dog cannot access them. Also, keep all compost piles out of reach. Another problem with yeast dough is that the yeast <u>ferments carbohydrates</u> in the dough, producing ethanol (alcohol). Ingested yeast dough can potentially cause alcohol poisoning in your pup.



# Human foods that are toxic to





#### Caffeine and Coffee

Many humans start the day with a cup of coffee. But our four-legged companions don't need the caffeine jolt. Also, dogs are far more sensitive to caffeine. Even a <u>small</u> <u>amount</u> can be toxic to them. Make sure coffee grounds are disposed of where a curious pup can't get them. And remember that caffeine isn't only in coffee. Check the labels on other energy-boosting products to make sure the caffeine stays away from your dog.

#### Tea and tea bags

Tea may help you relax, but its caffeine content can make it poisonous for dogs. Keep your canine companion away from your teacup and away from tea bags that make it into the trash or compost pile.



#### Soda

Keep your pup away from the soda as well since it can be a source of caffeine. Some sodas, especially if they are labelled as sugar-free, also contain xylitol. Both caffeine and xylitol are toxic to dogs.



#### Baked goods

Baked goods can contain several substances that can be harmful for dogs. Whether homemade or from a box, these items can contain: Chocolate, Xylitol, Caffeine.



#### Alcohol

Dogs should not consume beverages or foods that contain alcohol. Some dogs are attracted to alcoholic drinks, so be sure you do not leave alcoholic beverages unattended. Alcohol depresses the central nervous system and can cause the following <u>symptoms in dogs</u>: Vomiting, Diarrhea, Depression, Drooling, Decreased coordination, Difficulty breathing, Weakness, Collapse, Tremors, Coma and Death.



#### Macadamia Nuts

If you are a fan of macadamia nuts, keep them stored well out of reach of curious paws. All it takes are a few to poison a medium-sized dog. Dogs with <u>macadamia nut</u> <u>poisoning</u> may show: Weakness, Depression, Vomiting, Tremors and Hyperthermia.



#### Uncooked doughs containing yeast

If your canine companion takes a bite out of your bread, you probably don't have to be concerned. However, you should never feed your dog uncooked <u>yeast dough</u>. The dough can rise once in the dog's stomach, causing the <u>stomach to bloat</u>. Bloating can cause the stomach to twist, which is a life-threatening emergency.



#### **Pudding Snacks**

It's best to keep pudding snacks away from your dog. They may contain xylitol or chocolate, which are toxic for dogs.



# Human foods that are toxic to









Your dog should not eat avocados. Avocados contain <u>persin</u>, a toxin that causes diarrhea and vomiting in dogs and can be deadly. Though avocado is considered a "healthy fat" for humans, it is also too high in fat for dogs, putting them at risk of <u>pancreatitis</u>.

#### Cherries

The stems, leaves, and pits of cherries contain <u>cyanide</u>, a potentially deadly chemical. Cyanide <u>kills tissues</u> by making it difficult for them to use oxygen. The only part of a cherry that does not contain cyanide is the fleshy part around the pit. However, we don't recommend feeding that to your dog, either. Cherries can get caught in your pup's airway and become a choking hazard.

#### **Grapes and Raisins**

Both grapes and their dried form, raisins, are known to be <u>highly toxic</u> to dogs. It only takes a few grapes or raisins to cause sudden kidney failure in your dog. Keep these far out of reach.

#### Tomatoes

Dogs should avoid tomatoes. While fully ripened tomatoes are safe, the green part of the plant contains a substance called <u>solanine</u>, which is toxic to dogs. To avoid any potential issues, it's better to steer clear altogether.



#### Mushrooms

Avoid feeding your dog any mushrooms. Though only a fraction of existing <u>mushroom</u> <u>species</u> are known to be poisonous to dogs, those that are can be deadly. Identifying mushrooms can be tricky, even for experts. Therefore, you can never be 100% sure your dog would be getting a safe variety. Even one bite of a <u>toxic mushroom</u> could be fatal. So, to be safe, avoid the fungi.



#### Onions

Dogs should <u>never eat onions</u>. Onions contain a compound that damages dogs' red blood cells, causing <u>anaemia</u>. Check all <u>food ingredients</u>, and do not feed your dog anything that contains onion, onion powder, or onion flakes. The same goes for leeks, garlic, and chives, which, like onions, are all part of the allium family of plants.



#### Garlic

Garlic is considered the most <u>toxic of all the plants</u> in the allium family. Keep all foods containing garlic out of paw's reach. Otherwise, ingestion of garlic can severely damage red blood cells, causing them to rupture.



#### Wild Berries

Do not allow your dog to eat any wild berries. Though not all of these berries are poisonous, many are. It is always better to be safe than sorry.



## HIP DYSPLASIA

#### What is hip dysplasia?

Hip dysplasia is a deformity of the hip that occurs during growth. The hip joint is a ball and socket joint. During growth, both the ball (the head of the femur, or thighbone) and the socket in the pelvis (acetabulum) must grow at equal rates.

#### What causes it?

Hip dysplasia is a genetic disease that is affected by factors such as diet, environment, exercise, growth rate, muscle mass, and hormones. As this disease is most commonly seen in large breed dogs, these puppies should be kept at a normal, lean weight during growth, not overfed or encouraged to grow big.

#### What can a breeder do to prevent hip dysplasia?

While genetics play a significant role in the development of hip dysplasia, it is not necessarily always the breeder's fault. Let's face it, the expression of genetics and the combinations of DNA in each individual dog is biologically random. Breeders cannot control the expression of genes; they can only choose not to breed with affected dogs. Scientists have been looking for Genes that are responsible for the development of hip dysplasia in dogs for decades without success.

Hip dysplasia, however, is known to be hereditary and can be passed down from one generation to the next. There are 12 different genes responsible for coding for this disease and they exist on the genome in different locations. Some genes are closely related to the behavioral traits that are very desirable in pet dogs, so it is virtually impossible to eliminate all of the markers that code for Hip Dysplasia.

In addition, the severity of hip dysplasia can vary depending on various factors, such as environmental conditions, diet, exercise, and other health factors.

A responsible breeder will typically try to avoid breeding dogs with known hip dysplasia, and they may also conduct health screenings to identify and remove dogs with the condition from their breeding program. This is where the hip scoring programs are very helpful. A responsible breeder will always score their breeding dog's hips and know their dog's hip score numbers.

However, even with careful breeding practices, hip dysplasia can still occur due to the complexity of the condition and its various contributing factors.

Ultimately, it is not possible to prevent hip dysplasia, and both responsible breeders and owners should work together to minimize the risk of the condition developing in their dogs through proper care, nutrition, and exercise.

In conclusion, you can't breed against hip dysplasia. It's mostly caused by environmental factors. No "purebred" population is or will ever be free from hip dysplasia. So even if the parents, grandparents, and great-grandparents have good hip scores, the pup can still develop hip dysplasia due to environmental factors.

#### Pedigree Papers Fact Sheet

#### Why does the MDBA have a Stud Registry?

The MDBA has a stud registry because we believe that documenting the ancestry and progeny of dogs is critical to better breeding as it allows our breeders the ability to track genetic health and temperament throughout a dogs' ancestry.

The stud registry enables MDBA breeders to use science rather than luck when breeding our puppies and we like to know without any doubt who your puppy's mother and father, aunties, uncles, brothers, sisters and grandparents are so we have as much information as possible to make the best decisions in our breeding programs.

MDBA breeder members select their breeding dogs with the primary aim of producing healthy puppies with a great temperament and focusing on what is best for their dogs and those they breed. Using the breed standard of their breed is also used to ensure they breed predictable and healthy purebred puppies now and for future generations to come.

As a puppy buyer the registration certificate can be seen as your puppy's birth certificate that shows its family tree.

#### What makes MDBA pedigree papers different?

The MDBA pedigree papers are different from other traditional stud registry papers as we show health results and many types of canine achievements as well as your puppy's ancestors.

The MDBA has become increasingly concerned about the general health of dogs and the health and welfare of specific breeds. We will always focus on what's best for dogs and because of this we document health and temperament results on our pedigrees. We believe that by having this transparency it shows the true state of pedigree dogs.

Our pedigrees show any qualifications a dog has including working dog qualifications and the type of work a dog is doing, for example, working with goats or working as an assistance dog.

#### When do pet owners get their puppy's pedigree?

You will get your pedigree papers within 6 months of purchasing your puppy. It is not possible for the pedigree papers to be available when your puppy arrives home.

There are a few reasons for this:

- As the microchip information is entered onto the pedigree papers a breeder must wait until their puppies are microchipped before they register their litter with the MDBA.
- As the MDBA requires all the puppies in the litter to be registered at the same time breeders must wait
  until all of their puppies are sold before registering your puppy. In some cases your puppy could be at
  your home for a few weeks before the last puppy in the litter is sold.
- Once the MDBA receives the litter registration it generally takes 14 21 *working* days to process and sometimes it can take longer if the MDBA has an unusually high number of litters to be entered into the stud registry. The MDBA posts the pedigree certificates to your puppy's breeder who then posts them out to you.
- The postal system can cause delays.

This process can seem to be slow for a new puppy buyer who is excited with their new puppy's arrival and who have heard stories of unscrupulous breeders but the speed in which you will receive your MDBA registration papers depends on a lot of variables, many of which are beyond the breeder's control.

Please take your new baby home, relax and enjoy the experience and know that you will receive your puppy's registration certificate as soon as we can possibly get it to you.
